

#### From the Minister



I have been trying to be more positive in life. It is too easy to look and see problems everywhere. This person has a problem so they need a visit, the sound system has problem, and that church has a problem ..... I have been learning that when I look at problems I get depressed and demotivated because there are always more problems. The opposite occurs when I look for what is working, what are a person's strengths, where are the signs of hope. I am energised to do more of what works, I get to celebrate tiny successes, and I think of people as amazingly resilient and capable.

I think some Christians need to do this with Easter. If we do any introspection, we see our faults and sins (we might quote Psalm 51 "For I

know my transgressions, and my sin is always before me"). We may be grateful for Easter Friday - that Jesus suffered in my place and through his death I am forgiven. However, like any problem solving focus, there is always another problem just around the corner (I will fail again.) The end result of this approach is often a lack of energy in our Christian life because it is always lived backwards. I sin, I ask Jesus to forgive which he does, repeat cycle. don't see my successes and growth, only my failures.

A focus on Easter Sunday changes our thinking. We start by thinking no matter what I do or have done -Jesus has already overcome it, I am already loved, I am already a child of God. An Easter Sunday focus recognises that I have done horrible things (rejected God, hurt others...) but God has already dealt with that. Our focus is on the generous, relentless love of God. I can also focus on new life and the blessing and opportunities I am given. I can dream about what I can become, how I might use this new life God has given me.

Appreciative inquiry has been a help for me in this quest to be more positive. Appreciative inquiry (AI) is appreciative in that you focus on what is good, on what gives life, before you dream about "What Might Be?". It is inquiry because you can dream your desired future and then decide what steps to take to build on your strengths and create the better future. It is much forward focused. more Martin Luther king embodied this in his "I have a Dream" speech.

During March we are looking at of the inducing some anxiety challenges of our time, Carona virus, war, the economy, the climate... The news has more than enough to provoke anxiety attack an encourage you to start drinking. But **Appreciative** an Inquiry approach might say lockdowns are hard but we can get to know our



neighbours better and the church can live out what it means to be a community. Wars are horrible, but we have survived them before by pulling together and working for peace. The cost of living is a challenge but maybe we can learn what our grandmothers knew. We may not have solved Climate change yet but we are riding our bikes more and have more efficient fires and cars, we have taken small steps in a bigger journey.

So I am looking for strengths, I am looking for signs of love and hope, I am looking for signs that God is at work. And the result is I am more grateful. The result is more optimistic, the result is I am more energized to keep working. Easter is going to be marvellous, a reminder that new life has come, that death is vanquished, that God is at work even on the darkest of days. We hope you can join us for our Easter services:

# MODERATOR'S 2022 SEASON OF

# LENT MESSAGE

The temptation of Jesus speaks to our human condition me stretched to the limit! That in turn speaks to us at this time, as we enter a third Lenten season under the shadow of Covid, with angry camped outside protestors Parliament, hospitality and tourism businesses going to the wall, and heightened anxiety in response to the fast-approaching Omicron wave. We are being stretched.

For us, as for Jesus, there are tensions, temptations, and taunts to cope with.

In my mind's eye I can see the tension on the face of Jesus as he came to the end of his 40 day fast. The biblical text simply says, 'he was hungry'. I read a quirky novel once that went into graphic detail about how a fast this long would actually affect him! The haggard tension on his face from the sustained deprivation would be palpable. We too know tension from sustained pressure. We face ongoing cycles of planning and cancellation, anxiety and relief, hope and despair. Most of us have relationships strained by differing opinions.

Αt this point of extreme vulnerability for Jesus. he tempted to take false paths. What are the temptations we face at this time of vulnerability? Early in the pandemic the temptations were around economy verses health. Now it comes to us in the form of demonizing those who disagree with us, and some proclaiming individual rights versus the good of all.

And there are the taunts. The devil saved this best for the last when it came to Jesus – "if you are the son of God...". I see this kind of behaviour on TV, and I hear it on the deck after a game of golf: politicians mocked and even threatened, police belittled, and school students teased for wearing masks! It is hard to deal with.

So how did Jesus deal with the tension, temptations and taunts? Huge resilience indeed. And the text gives two sources for this resilience, still available to us today. One was the filling of the Holy Spirit. The other, a deep and informed use of scripture that empowered him to combat the misinformed misuse that was thrown at him


As we navigate the tension, temptations, and taunts in our context this Lent, may we too draw on these deep spiritual resources to sustain us.

In a season popular for what we can give up, I have always thought the emphasis should be more on what we can take up! Now, as much as ever, we need to be taking up spiritual practices which allow us to be more and more open to the sustaining power of the Holy Spirit and to the scriptures that carried Jesus through a time such as this.


## Year 9—Zach Donovan
